**PRESENT PROFESSIONAL WORK—Independent Practice, Family & Clinical Psychology,
Work with couple/family and individual problems and with relationship enhancement.**

I focus on helping strengthen the couple relationship and the overall family relationships using a systemic framework which takes account of each family member's individuality, inter-relationships, and their dynamic living context (e.g. work, school, community). I draw on experience gained while working in diverse mental health settings (e.g. independent practice, public and private clinics, university counseling centers, etc.) for over 35 years with clients suffering from an array of psychological problems. I continue to be informed by up-dated contemporary basic psychological and therapy-specific research findings.

In working with a couple and/or family I concentrate first on problem-understanding and then mutually planning a process for ameliorating or managing psychological difficulties. Secondly, because my professional experience, our field's research, and common sense indicate to me that absence of significant mental health problems does not automatically lead to life satisfaction, I use psychological approaches to help couples enrich their relationship and work to foster individual and family development to improve life satisfaction.

I am experienced with conducting psychotherapy and counseling with couples and families, and individuals at many different stages of the life cycle, including mid-life and beyond. I more often work with couples and families: (1) headed by professionals (doctoral, medical, professional/graduate school level) and entrepreneurs, including psychologists and other mental health professionals; (2) couples at mid-life and beyond; (3) with an emerging adult (18 to 25 plus); and (4) families with an ADD/ADHD member. I do not do child therapy and only occasionally see adolescents briefly in individual therapy. I work with the entire family, counsel on parenting as needed, referring children for therapy when appropriate.

Research surveys indicate people seek help most frequently for troubles stemming from dysfunctional couple and family relationships. While I concentrate on these, I also conduct individual and/or relationship-oriented psychotherapies with other psychological difficulties such as depression and anxiety, or behavioral difficulties.

I use validated, normalized, psychological questionnaires to discuss findings with clients in order to enhance mutual understanding of clients and their relationships. Then, as alluded to already, we plan together to lay a path toward agreed-upon treatment goals. We pause periodically as we follow this path to see if we are progressing as planned or need to adjust our approach as we experience bumps in the road. To maximize the odds of a positive outcome I often collaborate with other professionals (e.g. primary care physicians, child therapists, psychiatrists, etc.), and may suggest self-help groups as well.

Collaborative Divorce (CD) Services Coaching and Divorce Recovery Groups:

I work as a coach on CD teams whose members consist of other mental health professionals, family lawyers, and (where needed) a financial specialist. This team provides divorce assistance that is collaborative within its team functioning and with families, and works outside the court-based system. As a new service, I conduct Divorce Recovery Groups designed for those who have a new divorce agreement (through whatever the divorce process), wish to accelerate divorce recovery process, and need to move ahead toward life satisfaction.

I have provided direct, private collaborative practice divorcing services in San Francisco/Bay Area counties beginning in the mid-1990s as one of the developers of the Collaborative Divorce (CD), a system now spread North America wide and overseas. I taught, presented, and authored my first articles (with Dr. Peggy Thompson) describing CD in the mid-1990s, and continue writing to the present. I received the California Eureka! Award in 2007, in recognition of being a pioneer of Collaborative Divorce practice. For almost two decades before my switch to co-developing and practicing CD I conducted child custody evaluations nationally. I experienced how the court-based system was often traumatic for families despite the best of intentions of most professionals working in the system.
